The Great West Windsor Cemetery Hunt of 2011



WEST WINDSOR PATRIOTISM

The Patriotism in this town continues with unabated vigor. The military, lately organized, bids fair to make a fine company, judging from the character and enterprise of its officers: as also of many of its privates. Flags continue to be raised in every section. The ladies are awake manifesting much zeal in our national affairs. The ladies in the

west part of town, in the west school district, so called, got up a beautiful flag of goodly dimensions, which was raised last Saturday in the afternoon, upon a pole 110 feet in height. Early in the afternoon the people in the vicinity and the adjoining towns began to collect: the "New Military" formed at Sheddsville and marched within one fourth of a mile, where they were joined by the ladies, some forty in number,

who marched in procession to the spot. Although disappointed in not obtaining their speaker -- the Rev. Mr. Closson of Cavendish -- the exercises were very appropriate and satisfactory; which consisted in the firing of guns, sentiments, singing, martial music and "cheering" which made the hills resound for miles around.

HURRICANE IRENE, SUNDAY, AUGUST 28, 2011



Hurricane Irene hit the east coast with a vengeance. Although it was downgraded to a tropical storm when it arrived in New England States, many, if not most Vermont communities, were pummeled. Rivers and brooks swelled and overflowed, many times rerouting themselves, carving out huge chunks of roads,

collapsing bridges, and ripping through homes. Brownsville suffered its losses as well. In Brownsville, two significant bridges were swept away. One on Route 44 just east of the village, and the Bowers covered bridge located just south of the intersection of the Westgate, Bible Hill, and Harrington Roads.

Three noteworthy structures in the village of Brownsville, the Brownsville General Store, Fire House, and old Schoolhouse (which is now a the Smith residence) were also damaged in



the flood. Fortunately the General Store was able to open the next day with damage limited to the basement. The Fire House suffered significant

destruction to the parking lot and driveway as well as the first main floor. The Smith's house closest to where the Mill Brook and Beaver Brook merge had to be evacuated as water breached the bank and began to rip through the property and into basement windows.

Additional areas that suffered considerable damage were Rush Meadow Road, Brook Road and the west side of Banister Road. The road crew has fortunately restored some parts of Banister Road and Brook Road to the existing homes, however, both are

no longer a through roads.

Townsfolk everywhere responded with humanity and compassion to those who were ravaged by the floods. On the



following Saturday friends, neighbors and family arrived at the Smiths' home early in the morning to begin the clean up. Paul Biebel donated the use of his equipment, two dumpsters arrived and everyone began the long process of cleaning up. They worked tirelessly throughout the day, to clean out the finished basement which had been ruined by the flood waters and filled with debris. * 7KBodnar

GEORGE A. SWALLOW -- GLASS PLATE NEGATIVES COLLECTION

The Leahy Library recently received a tremendous gift of 482 glass plate negatives taken by Brownsville, Vermont, resident George Swallow at the beginning of the twentieth century. "This collection documents the buildings, landscape, and people of this West Windsor village in a very skilled and sensitive way," says Vermont Historical Society librarian Paul Carnahan.

The collection came to the historical society through a

circuitous route. It was offered for sale to Vermont Historical Society trustee J. Brooks Buxton of Jericho, who immediately recognized the importance of the collection and purchased it for the society. Upon examining the collection further, Brooks took an immediate liking to the collection and contracted with a local digital imaging company to create scans of 100 of the images. All that was known about the glass plates at this time was that they showed some Brownsville scenes; the photographer was unknown.

In April of this year Brooks brought the full collection of plates in their original boxes, 33 in all, and a compact disc of scans to Barre. The library staff immediately set to work trying to identify the photographer. They noticed that the inventories on many of the boxes mentioned "Carolyn," who seemed to be a young girl. A quick search of the 1900 census showed only one Carolyn in West Windsor: Carolyn Swallow, aged six. Her father was George A. Swallow, a jeweler who ran his own shop. Her mother was "Alma," a name that also showed up on the boxes of glass plates.

A quick check of *The Heritage* of *West Windsor* by Erla Bear Scull (1980) informed us that George Swallow "was one of the most interesting personalities found in

the records of the community." He seems to have been quite handy, repairing watches, running a printing shop, raising bees, and fishing. No mention of a photographic interest was included in the biography of Swallow, but a search on Ancestry.com turned up photographs of George Swallow posing with a camera. It was clear that we had identified the photographer!

Swallow lived in the village of Brownsville in the town of West Windsor where he operated a general store, was postmaster, and pumped gas. Many of his photographs show the geographic area where he lived in the heart of Brownsville, including people sitting on the porch of his store and wagons stopped on the street in front of it. Indeed, as donor Buxton states, the collection "represents a microcosm of life in a Vermont village at the turn of the twentieth century."

Swallow (1864-1951) captured the buildings, landscapes, and activities of his community. The collection includes several of the construction of the new civic building known as Story Memorial Hall, which was dedicated in 1915, and the Mary L. Blood Memorial Library, which had been given to the town in 1901.



The collection includes several images of large groups of people gathered on top of nearby Mount Ascutney, as well as photos of a baseball game, having, sugaring, prized livestock, a new motor car, and the bounty from hunting expeditions. Among the images are photographs of "The McKinley Stone," a huge piece of granite that had been quarried nearby from the base of Mt. Ascutney and was headed to Canton, Ohio, to be used as one of the sarcophagi in the McKinley National Memorial there.

Swallow also took pictures of the countryside near his home. According to Buxton, "He had a genuine feeling for Vermont topography and his attachment to the land." Upon viewing scans of some of Swallow's images for the

> first time, Jennifer Bodnar, a member of the board of directors of the West Windsor Historical Society, said.

They are a treasure to behold. As I opened each image on my laptop I felt as though I was able to travel back in time, turning back the years seeing the people, the buildings and roads that made up this town and helped create it as it is today. I am particularly struck by the Post Office/General Store which is next door to where I live and

where George A. Swallow once lived. The picture was taken out of the bedroom window and a horse drawn. stage-coach is pulled up to the front of the Post Office. My how times have changed! Thanks for sharing this treasure trove.

The Vermont Historical Society will be sharing George Swallow's images with the West Windsor Historical Society to assure that they have the most exposure possible. A selection of his images is on the VHS's Flickr photo sharing site at www.flickr.com/vermonthistory.
